



My Drift

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

On Saturday, 21 March, while watching a seven-year old basketball game and drinking a few Coors Lights, I decided it was time to check out a few new beers. In my outside patio refrigerator, I had about a dozen Coors Lights and about a dozen Miller Lites. My beer of choice for the last 30 or so years is Coors Light. My son Mike likes Miller Lite, so I keep some in my refrigerator just in case he comes over to the house.

So, for this important Beer Research Project, I will buy a variety of different beers to rate and to see if I can find a beer or two that I like better than Coors Light. Minimum sample size was eight 12-ounce (or more) cans or bottles. This project ends when the bars open again in Hawaii.




My Beer Drinking History

I have a long and distinguished beer drinking career. Since I turn 80 years old in a couple of months (as of this writing), I may have a little trouble remembering some things that happened in my younger years. In fact, there were many days in my younger years that I had trouble remembering what happened the night before. But I will give it a shot.

The first time I remember drinking beer was with my best friends Lew and Benny when we were about ten years old. We would steal some beer (or wine or whiskey) and go drink it in Benny's family apple orchard. We had fun! My dad used to make his own beer on occasion, and I would take a few bottles to the apple orchard to drink with my friends. This beer was not the best tasting beer in the world but back in those days we didn't know any better.

I grew up in a small town in Utah where the official drinking age is 21 but the unofficial drinking age for beer was/is 18. The only bar in town was (and still is) the Pool Hall (Star Saloon) and this is where I learned how to play pool and drink beer with the big boys. My first beer of choice back then was regular Coors. Come to think of it, light beer had not even been invented yet.





Then it was off to college in the fall of 1958. I attended the University of Utah in Salt Lake City on a basketball scholarship. I stayed in the dorm where they put all the athletes on campus. Those of you that think basketball and football players don't drink and smoke and party have never stayed in an athletic dorm. On top of that, some of us joined a fraternity on campus that catered to the jocks. Every weekend there was a big party at the fraternity where we would drink beer by the keg. I got pretty good at chugging beer by the mug. In fact, I won most chugging contests since I could drink a 20 oz mug in less than 3 seconds. Since the college was only 40 miles from my home and I had a car (1953 Ford) my parents purchased for me, I could go home whenever I needed a good meal and to get my dirty clothes washed.



After college, I joined the Navy and went to Boot Camp in San Diego. I was there for over two months with no beer. After that, I was stationed at the Naval Air Station in New Iberia, Louisiana for 5 months. I can't remember what kind of beer I drank in Louisiana at that time. Then I went to weather school at Lakehurst Naval Base in New Jersey. One of the instructors was a Navy Chief and a bartender in town. I spent a lot of time at that bar playing pool, darts, and shuffleboard. My beer of choice then was Rolling Rock. The Navy kept me at Lakehurst for another year and a half so that I could play basketball on the weather school and the base teams.

Finally, the Navy decided it was time for me to go to work so they sent me to Naval Air Station Port Lyautey in Morocco, Africa to work at the Fleet Weather Central. I can't remember what brand I drank there. After a few months, they moved the Fleet Weather Central to Rota, Spain. Just for the record, I hated Morocco and loved Spain. I spent almost two years in Spain (I got extended there because of the Cuba missile crisis) and it was great. The beer and wine were excellent – I mostly drank San Miguel beer.



After I got out of the Navy in 1966, I got a job with the Federal Government at Tooele Army Depot in Tooele, Utah and became a Computer Programmer. I went back to drinking regular Coors until I got the job at Fort Shafter in Honolulu, Hawaii. During my early years in Hawaii, I drank Primo and Olympia beer. Both were good but not great.





As part of my job at Fort Shafter, I performed a lot of TDY over the years. I went all over the United States for computer training and big part of the world for TDY work. I made the most trips to South Korea and Japan. During the last few years of my government career, I visited Okinawa and Alaska several times. While in Japan, I usually drank Kirin beer – this beer was part of my beer study. Here are a few beers from the other places:

So, why did I start drinking Coors Light? Well, I started drinking Coors Light in the mid-1980s shortly after I joined a bowling team at Fort Shafter Lanes. We bowled every Wednesday night from 6pm to about 8:30pm. Sometimes I would take Wednesday afternoon off and go to a bar to drink and play pool or Cribbage with a bowling friend. We would drink and play until about 5pm and then head to the bowling alley. I'm pretty sure that drinking beer is a standard requirement for all bowlers. At about 9pm it would be time to drive the 14 miles to my home in Mililani. Some nights after drinking beer for 8 or 9 hours, I

would feel a little bit drunk. I decided that it might be a good idea to switch to a "light" beer. I was not about to give up my enjoyable Wednesday afternoons and bowling with friends. I tried a few light beers and decided I liked Coors Light the best and have been drinking it every since.

After drinking beer for almost 70 years all over the world, I think I might be qualified to judge a few beers from the local market while the bars are closed, and I'm trying to stay home due to the Hawaii Coronavirus Stay-at-Home order.

^{*} Pilsner is a type of Lager, but a bit lighter in color and with a strong spicy flavor.

As you can see from the above recap, I tested 9 domestic (US) beers and 7 foreign beers. I'm afraid I didn't buy the best domestic beers (except for Budweiser) for this test so the results might not look good for the good ole USA. However, I found out that most of these so-called foreign beers are actually brewed in the US.

Let's get on with it – here is how I ranked the 16 beers with my comments:

#16 Big Wave – This is a Golden Ale that has a strong bitter fruity taste that I didn't like. I did finish all 8 cans and would drink this brand again if it was the only beer left on earth.

#15 Gold Cliff IPA – This India Pale Ale (made in Hawaii) was pretty good but I could still taste a hint of that nasty bitter ale. However, if you want to get high fast, this is the beer to drink since it has an alcohol content of 7.2%.

#14 Guinness – This dark stout beer is too stout for me. This beer is special for a lot of people, but I could not drink more than a couple of cans of this black heavy beer at a sitting. I was surprised to find out it has only a 4.3% alcohol content.

#13 Pabst Blue Ribbon – This American lager beer is good. Over the years, I have purchased and drank Pabst Blue Ribbon several times. The 12 pack I purchased at Safeway cost \$9 dollars. Most of the other beers for his study cost around \$14 for a 12 pack. Pabst is a bargain!

#12 Longboard – This is a Hawaii larger beer that I thought was good but not great. If I ever drink more beer from the Kona Brewing Company, it will be Longboard.

#11 Natural Light – This light lager is a popular Anheuser-Busch brand but not as popular as Bud Light. It was easy to drink, and I could probably drink it all day and still drive home. If they ever stop making Coors Light, this beer may become my beer of choice – I like it better than Bud Light.

#10 Heineken – This pale lager may be one of the world's most popular beers, but it has a slight bitter taste. Heineken is a good beer but not my favorite.

#9 Rolling Rock – This extra pale lager tastes like a light beer but has a real kick to it.

#8 Miller Lite – This Light pilsner is the original American light beer. It has more body than most other light beers I have tried. It is good and sometimes I drink it at home even when my son is not there.

#7 Coors Light – This American lager tastes good to me and it is easy to drink. Hey, I know that some of my friends don't think "light" beer is real beer, but I like it. Besides, I'm not rating it #1 – there are better beers.

#6 Foster's – This pale lager tastes a little strong but good. I always thought this beer come from Australia. Nope! It is originally from Australia, but it is now brewed in Fort Worth, Texas.

#5 Beck's – This Pilsner is an excellent beer. Germany has many great beers as I found out during my visit there in 1990. The Zweibrucken area is very scenic and me and my boss Art had a great time with our good friends who were living and working in Germany. The Pils keg draft beer was especially good!

#4 Pacifico – This Mexican pilsner-style beer is excellent. I first started drinking Pacifico draft beer at a Mexican restaurant in Mililani called 'Just Tacos'. The beer was very cold, and I thought it was the best draft beer I ever had. Mexico has several top selling beers here in the US, but I don't plan on drinking that beer called Corona since it would remind me of a certain virus we are all trying to forget.

#3 Budweiser – It has been several years since I had a Bud and I guess I forgot how good this beer is. I will be stocking my fridge with more Budweiser.



#2 Kirin – This Japanese Rice Lager beer is the brand I used to drink when TDY in Japan. It is an excellent beer with a little more body than most lagers.

AND THE #1 BEST TASTING BEER IN MY RESEARCH PROJECT IS -

#1 Sapporo – This Japanese lager is one of the most popular beers in Japan along with Kirin and Asahi Super Dry. I don't know why I didn't try this brand of beer on one of my many trips to Japan. The only reason I purchased Sapporo for this study is my wife sent to MARUKAI Wholesale Mart for some Japanese food and Sapporo was on sale for \$10 a 12-pack. I really liked this beer and will be stocking my fridge with it to drink at home.

Well, did you get the right answer? I doubt it. In fact, four of the top 10 selling brands in the world are from China. You probably knew this fact but there are a lot of people in China and it seems most of them like to drink beer.

Conclusion

I'm a firm believer in the fact that beer is a healthy drink. I'm living proof!

Most of Hawaii's restaurants are open again (on June 5th) and I know some of you are wondering what brand I will be drinking. Most of the bars I go to don't serve Kirin or Sapporo or Pacifico or Beck's, so I will stick to Coors Light. At home, I will definitely be drinking more Japanese beer along with Budweiser, Pacifico, and Beck's.

Statistics. Okay, I know that a few of you have your calculators out trying to figure out how many beers I drank during the restaurant and bar shutdown. Let me help you out. The total number of beers consumed by me was exactly 192 during this period which was exactly 76 days. Doing the math - that equals approximately 2.5 beers per day. There were a few days that I didn't have any beer at all and a few days where I had a few more than the average.

One thing for sure - those 192 beers made the "coronavirus home quarantine" a lot more bearable.
